President's Message

Welcome Fall! It's my favorite time of year! School has started, football is back on TV, leaves will be turning from green to orange, yellow and red and it is time for the 3rd Annual Lena Taste of Fall Event scheduled for Saturday Oct 6. Stop by to check out crafters/vendors, baked goods, Fire Dept booyah, music, barbeque cook-offs, family bike ride and much more. The location this year is on Main Street between the Wooden Shoe and the railroad tracks. Hope to see you there!

Recently you received a notice of a user rate increase regarding your utility service. It is never easy to decide to raise user rates. The Village Board understands that this may create hardships for some who are strug-

gling financially, but I can assure you that the rate increases were necessary to change the financial shortfalls that the Village is experiencing year after year. Implementing the rate increases now will prove to be a vital part in restructuring our utility finances and will pay positive dividends for years to come. We will also be investing in upgrades to our existing sewer related infrastructure to improve efficiencies and reduce energy consumptions. The improvements will offer payback on investments starting within 5 years along with modernizing our plant from the original design of almost 40 years ago.

Another critical component of managing costs can be directly tied to user consumption. Below are some ideas on how to conserve water as well as some items to look at that can be huge water guzzlers if left unattended or unnoticed.

- Fix your leaks. Whether you go DIY or hire a plumber, fixing leaky faucets can mean big water savings.
- Turn off the tap while washing your hands. Do you need the water to run while you're scrubbing your hands? Save a few gallons of water and turn the faucet off after you wet your hands until you need to rinse.
- Turn off the tap while brushing your teeth. Water comes out of the average faucet at 2.5 gallons per minute. Don't let all that water go down the drain while you brush! Turn off the faucet after you wet your brush, and leave it off until it's time to rinse
- **Head to the car wash.** If you feel compelled to wash your car, take it to a car wash that recycles the water, rather than washing at home with the hose.

- Cut your showers short. Older shower heads can use as much as <u>5 gallons of water per minute</u>. Speed things up in the shower for some serious water savings.
- Don't run the dishwasher or washing machine until it's full. Those half-loads add up to gallons and gallons of wasted water
- Choose efficient fixtures. Aerating your faucets, investing in a low-flow toilet, choosing efficient shower heads, and opting for a Water Sense rated dishwasher and washing machine can add up to big water savings.
- Keep an eye on your bill to spot leaks. If your water bill spikes suddenly, there's a good chance that a leak is the culprit. Call in a plumber to check your lines to save water and money!

Since the water flows down the sewer, leaking toilets don't necessarily leave any signs of a leak, until you get the bill. The average leaky toilet can waste about **200 gallons** of water per day. That's over 6,000 gallons a month for just one leaking toilet! A **simple and quick way to determine if your toilet is leaking** is to insert a couple drops of food coloring into the tank and don't flush your toilet for 20-30 minutes. Then, check to see if there is color in the toilet bowl. If there is, then you have a running toilet leak.

The Public Works Committee continues to evaluate our systems. We have had a few issues recently where homeowners have experienced excessively high-water usage. After our Water Department Personnel inspected these properties, they found that the causes for the extra usage were related to either bad plumbing fixtures or piping. Our current system has us manually reading meters quarterly. This is a long period of time to go before a leaking situation could be noticed by our staff when comparing usage numbers from the previous quarter. The Village water dept will be making a transition to new style water meters where usage will be able to be monitored on an instantaneous basis if needed. The change out to the new style meter will allow for leaks to be noticed sooner and help homeowners make the necessary repairs before accruing large amounts of wasted water. Hopefully you will find some of this information valuable. Small changes can add up to big savings. Enjoy the Fall weather. Before long, it will change again and Old Man Winter will be on the way.
