#### Marinette & Oconto Counties Literacy Council, Inc.

Imagine all the times we read during our day: was it the cereal box as we ate breakfast, the morning newspaper, then e-mails, directions to a new location, memos at work then at home, maybe helping a child with homework or even reading for pleasure? Now, imagine being unable to read or speak English and trying to get through our day, wondering if others are aware of the struggle.

Marinette & Oconto Counties Literacy Council, a non-profit organization and officially just three years old, was formed in response to those needs. Most areas in WI had a literacy council but ours had none prior to this Council forming. Covering all of Marinette and Oconto counties is a large area however, trained tutors are matched with adult students from the same location. The tutor and student then meet one on one weekly in a public location, as a library, using materials provided by the Council that is appropriate for the student's learning level. The tutor and student work towards goals established by the student for an approximate 6 month period although many choose to continue longer. The Board of Directors represents both counties and hail from a variety of backgrounds. All Board members and tutors are volunteer. Being a non-profit organization, the Council relies on grants, fundraisers and donations to maintain itself. Since its inception, 35 tutors have been trained yet there still remains a waiting list of students. To be a tutor, one must attend a 12 hour training session.

Credit should be given to the adult student who comes forward requesting assistance to read, write or speak English. It takes courage to step forward to ask for help with a skill that many of us take for granted.


# Lena Lanes Is Open


## Past Due Water/Sewer Bills

An online questionnaire distributed by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) showed that less than half (42 percent) of approximately 36,000 respondents did not know that a smoke alarm should be installed in each bedroom of the home.
